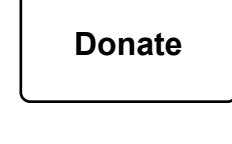
The above image is from a State Library curated Flickr album entitled [Kisses, Hugs and Holding Hands](#) featuring some beautiful photographs from our collections.

Message from the Governor of Queensland



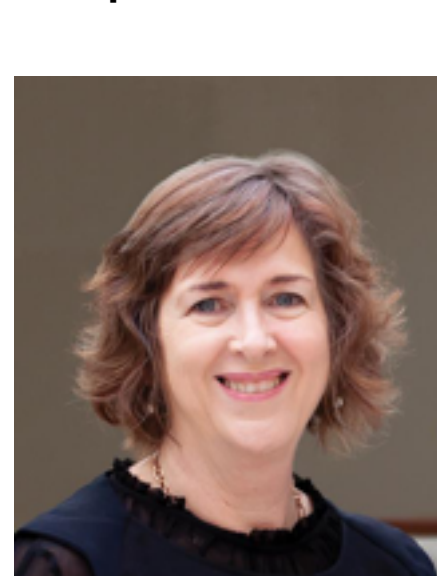
Since it was founded in 1988, the Queensland Library Foundation has had the unwavering support of the residing Governor of Queensland as our Foundation Patron.

This year, the announcement will take place on our [website](#) on Tuesday 9 June at 12 noon. Please log on and watch the ceremony from where ever you may be.

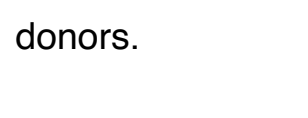
We also recently announced the [2020 black&write! Fellows](#), to whom we introduce you to in this newsletter.

Queensland Business Leaders Hall of Fame

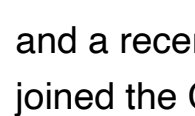


The [Queensland Business Leaders Hall of Fame](#) recognises the public contribution made by leaders of business to the reputation of Queensland and its economic and social development.

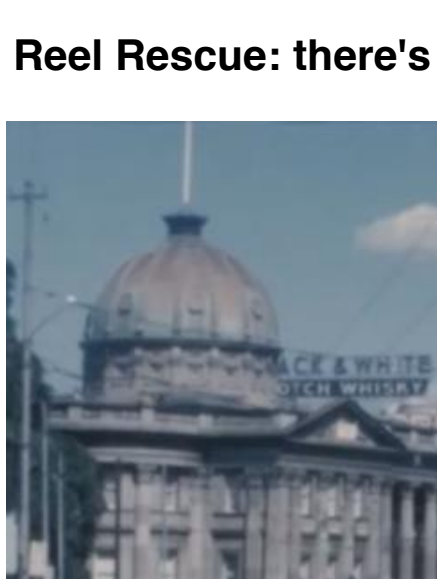
Our thanks to Ken MacDonald AM for sharing a blog about three outstanding Hall of Fame inductees that resonate with him.

Reel Rescue: there's no place like home



Donations to the Foundation's Reel Rescue film digitisation campaign have enabled State Library to give new life to some wonderful moving images captured by Queenslanders.

Donated films from the Podmore family of Esk, Phyllis Maitland and Merryl McKay take us back to the 1950s, 60s and 70s.

The Podmore's share with us [family moments](#) they enjoyed whilst holidaying on the Sunshine Coast in the late-50s.

Phyllis's [footage](#) shows Gold Coast beach scenes, meter maids and a show at the Water Ski Gardens in the 50s and 70s.

While, Merryl, who shot [her film](#) on a Bell & Howell 8mm movie camera, transports us to 1963 and the Centenary Pool Complex, Queensland Museum building, Customs House, the Story Bridge, Parliament House and the City Botanic Gardens.

Thank you to all our Reel Rescue donors who gift both funding and film. We will keep you updated as this collection continues to be digitised.

Digitising newspapers: read all about it!



Through the generosity of a group of eight donors, \$117,000 has been raised to digitise microfilm holding The Catholic Advocate newspaper (1911-1938).

These newspapers are considered important as they were independently published during some of the state's most turbulent times, namely World War I and in the lead up to World War II.

By preserving the microfilm contents, the newspapers will now be available on [Trove](#), an online portal established by the National Library of Australia, providing worldwide access to this collection. School engagement notes will also be developed for secondary learning.

Reconciliation and diversity were the resonant themes in the children and early reader stories selected for State Library's 2020 [black&write! Fellowships](#).
