True crime hits spotlight at State Library award ceremony

Criminal networks from the Fitzgerald Inquiry era will be investigated by the winner of a prestigious State Library of Queensland fellowship announced this evening.

The recipient of the John Oxley Library Honorary Fellowship, Associate Professor Mark Lauchs, will gain access to the restricted records of journalist Phil Dickie, held at State Library, that helped inform the 1989 Fitzgerald Inquiry report into police corruption.

He plans to uncover the social dynamics between criminals and public officials by mapping these previously hidden networks. By tracing social networks, his research will reveal how public institutions and individuals fall into corruption.

The winner of the \$20,000 John Oxley Library Fellowship, Dr Henry Reese will create a podcast on 'everyday machines' in colonial societies.

"From scientific spectacles to consumer goods and government-provided infrastructure, technologies such as the telegraph, telephone, electric lighting, cinema, sound recording, radio and music have played an important role in the complex visions Queenslanders have forged of themselves and their wider world," according to Dr Reese.

He aims to provide the first cultural history of electronic and communications technologies in Queensland in the late 1800s and early 1900s.

The seven Queensland Memory fellowships and awards are collectively worth \$70,000.

The Queensland Memory Awards are made possible by the support of donors through the Queensland Library Foundation.
