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
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THE COLOURED ECHIDNA

He noticed Goanna's beautiful, shiny yellow spots.


'I have never seen an echidna so colourful in all my days,' said Goanna.


'I am going to find Wise Old Owl. She will tell me why I have all these colours.'

'Why are you such pretty colours?' Baby Emu asked Coloured Echidna.


'I do not know,' said Coloured Echidna. 'But I heard Wise Old Owl can tell me.'


'Good luck!' the family said.

'Are you looking for me, Coloured Echidna?'


'Yes. Please, can you tell me why I am these colours?


Why am I not like everyone else?'

He thought about Black Crow and his brother.


He thought about Goanna.
